The students of present can get new ways of getting information, interesting format of information delivery, assessment, and etc.

A word cloud is an attractive way of visualizing a large chunk of text in a more pleasing way. It shows the most frequent words used throughout the text. The larger the text, the more commonly it was used. It's a good way of seeing which words are used the most in any piece of writing.

Here are just a few ideas on how you could use Word clouds in the classroom:

- Guess the book - works great when you have access to the text of famous books via sites such as Project Gutenberg.

- Use to introduce a topic - pupils could guess what they will be learning

about from a word cloud made of keywords.

- Comparing different newspapers look at the same story in a Broadsheet and a tabloid newspaper (website) and compare the word clouds produced - how do the words used differ?
- Self-reflection on work as Wordle makes a word larger the more frequently it is used, pupils will be able to see at a glance which words or phrases they are over-using. Are they using the word Nice or Good too often?
- Use to analyze the content and gist a longer written text, especially with exam or higher level groups.
- To introduce new vocabulary or to memorize new vocabulary/vocabulary lists.
- Revision of key topics and vocabulary pupils can create their own worldes or they can be given them to use.
- To give presentations without reading from a sheet and just using prompts.
- Encouraging creative writing from a selection of key words from a word cloud.

Word Cloud Guessing - Before we introduce a new concept to students, we should show them a word cloud on that topic, using an online generator (Wordle, Taxedo, or Tagul) to paste a paragraph or longer of related text, and challenge students to guess what the topic was.

Teachers can create a word cloud from a news article and use it to start a conversation. Students also may use visual word cloud to ask about new vocabulary which provides input to them. Before engaging students in speaking, by wordling key words teacher can increase the vocabulary knowledge of students about the

conversation. In pre-reading stage, after teacher wordling key words of a text, students can talk about these new words and predict the content of read teaching writing, brainstorming is one of the key techniques.

Students can use word clouds to generate ideas for new writing topic, themes. Baratt, Pennestri, and Selvandin (op cit) argued that word cloud also use as an assessment tool. They mentioned that "instructors can create word from students' individual essays and use them for self-assessment purposes, to the present study, the resulting word clouds as well as word frequency con show students' individual progress towards improving their vocabulary. The of text could derive from blog posts as opposed to essays; this could be est relevant for online classes.

Our teachers should be well-equipped with new technologies and themselves with new tools in language teaching. The researcher concluded the wordle is a necessity in teaching all four skills and also language compactness and students are benefit from in many ways.
